And that is why I recommend that we all read, if we have not already, Pascual Chavez's latest letter. There can be no authentic Salesian renewal without contemplating "the figure of Mary the Immaculate Help of Christians, in everything and always the Mother and Teacher of Don Bosco."

Mary pointed out to him that he was to be a shepherd to the young, imitating the goodness and loving kindness of her Son the Good Shepherd.

But then Mary did not withdraw into fuzzy half remembered dreams. As our Rule of Life puts it in C 8, she was "the constant guide and support of his work, especially in the foundation of our Society." Reading his Memoirs, reading Arthur Lenti's seven volumes on Don Bosco, we cannot miss how Mary the Immaculate Help of Christians guided and supported him every step of the way.

My reflection is that Mary still exercises both roles in the individual lives of each of us, and in the life of the province. She was there at the start of our vocations. And I believe firmly that she is our constant guide and support ever since. As our province opens itself up to the changes of mentality and structure, of personnel and perhaps of presences, that the chapters and the extraordinary visitation will call us to, we need to be convinced that Mary guides and supports us too.


