

Dear Brother and Sister Salesians:

Let's go back to the Rector Major's Closing Address for the Team Visit in El Salvador at the end of October. I already presented in this column the first of his four orientations for our Region: the need to return to Don Bosco, identifying his charismatic priority as our own, the evangelization of the young in North, Central, and South America.

Fr. Pascual's second of the four concluding orientations is that our InterAmerica Region cannot live off its glorious past, but

because of the new world and cultural situations, we must formulate and follow clear perspectives for a future just as rich as the past, indeed more. He divides this second orientation into three divisions: the quality of our religious life, the reconfiguration of our presences, and religious discipline.

- 1. For those of us who are SDB, we recognize that if there is little or only mediocre **quality to our religious life,** or if a Salesian community is not capable of renewing itself, then the work or ministry of that community will inevitably become weaker and weaker, and then die. I leave it to our own reflections to consider if that is not indeed the root cause of our having to leave or close down so many presences in the past, if that is not indeed the root cause of signs of weakness in some of our presences today.
- The Rector Major then challenges the Region to reconfigure our presences in order to create a future that safeguards and frees up the vitality of the Salesian charism. Restructuring should not be seen as just a strategy of survival, trying to prolong at all costs the existence of works that are now neither socially significant, nor pastorally valid, nor vocationally fruitful, nor economically sustainable. The reconfiguration of our works must not only be a decision of administrative management, but part of an authentic process of spiritual and pastoral renewal. It implies a NEW form of Salesian presence, a new form which better responds to the demands of our consecrated life and the needs of the young today. Our Province Organic Plan is only a first step in this direction.
- The majority of Salesians in our Region do live as faithful disciples of Jesus in the consecrated life. Nonetheless there are some who have failed in **religious discipline**, failed as disciples of the Lord, not living in conformity with the requirements of our Constitutions and Regulations, causing disorder, scandal and negatively impacting both the local and the provincial community. The area of financial transparency and accountability in the spirit of poverty is one such area. However this coming week's audit visit to the Province by PRAESIDIUM will challenge us to discipline ourselves in such a way that no child ever be at risk of misconduct in any Salesian presence again.

As we begin the Christmas Novena these days, we pray and sing that the Lord indeed come and give us HIS perspective for the future, a new heavens, a new earth.

Creating a Vocation Culture

Advent Greetings, Brothers and Sisters!

Please allow me to continue to share thoughts on building a "vocation culture" in our province:

From St. Anthony Messenger Press, <u>Catholic Update</u>: September 2008, Why be a religious today? What does it take? by Sister Janet Gildea, S.C

Here are some possible answers, outlined from the article:

- 1.) Good physical and mental health
- 2.) Deepening commitment to Jesus Christ
- 3.) Capacity for generous service
- 4.) Ability to live a celibate life
- 5.) Ability to embrace a simple lifestyle



What about Salesian characteristics? Are there any similarities and / or differences?

- 1.) The National Study of Youth and Religion (NSYR) and the VISION Vocation Guide annual surveys report an increase in those discerning a call to religious life and priesthood, especially those under 30. Vocation discernment needs to be an integral part of the faith formation of youth, everywhere.
- 2.) We also need to encourage and remind parents, uncles, aunts and anyone in family households to assist us in vocation promotion. Parental attitudes toward priesthood and religious life can determine whether or not those life choices make it onto a young person's radar screen. (They have many options or distractions—temptations.)
- 3.) Take nothing for granted. Never underestimate your ability to influence a choice. Be not afraid but take courage! To paraphrase Mother Teresa, "It's not about numbers; it's about fidelity." In other words, discipleship is not about nothingness or qualification, it's about responding to God's invitation and love.

Are we asking the right questions to give us good direction for promoting and creating a "vocation culture?" Here are some of my personal reflection that might assist us to ask the right questions:

- 1.) Be visible. Be courageous. Active presence means to be involved and to participate in activities with young people and /or groups. The MOP initiatives, led by Joe Rodriguez and his team and shared in this InTouch, is an example.
- 2.) Invite! You are necessarily important. Delete "It's Fr. Chinh's or someone else's job" attitude. Believe!
- 3.) Be attentive by seeking out vocation possibilities. Get others to help invite vocation.

That is all for now. My hope is to be able to discuss with your community these points and more, as we find ways to invite others, especially young people, to answer the call to serve.

how wonderful our God is and then Joe Rodriquez pointed up the mountain, reminding us that we were here to do some hiking. Bible (Mat. 13:3-8). This gave the youth the feeling of how it may have been long ago when Jesus spoke to His people, preaching to them outside on the open grass and not necessarily in a church environment. We then gathered our things and the youth lead the way to the top of the mountain.

During our journey we encountered rough terrain, large boulders, dead ends, bees and of course the fact that we were all out of shape. We found out that some people were afraid of heights and that others were very daring. But most important, we stood by each other and everyone helped each other get through the obstacles. We

were not able to get to the very top of the mountain this time, but we did get up high enough to see a spectacular view. We could see for miles.

The way back down the mountain was a little easier. Back at the bottom of the mountain we gathered together again to talk about our adventure. I reflected with them that we all started at the bottom and that Heaven is like the top of the mountain.

Our focus was to get there. Life gives us the same challenges. Some hurdles are as big as the boulders we climbed, some paths we follow are dead ends. but if we continue on the right path, we eventually get to the top. Furthermore, going off the path can sometimes

hurt us, or our loved ones. We found that out when we detoured and found the bees. When it got tough we helped each other, which is how social justice works. That is how we succeeded in our adventure and that is how we will succeed in life.

Nov. 20-22,2011 Agenda Summary

Location: Corpus Christi Parish, San Francisco

1. Province Organic Plan

Al Vu led adiscussion of the 24 page Province Organic Plan, 2011-2014. Copies will be distributed to every Salesian and to everyone on the Leadership List of the province. The Council discussed how communities and departments of the province will be encouraged to study the document. And, on Nov. 30th, each Salesian will receive a copy of Memoirs of the Oratory to help with study of Don Bosco for 2015.

2. Formation

Gael Sullivan introduced summer evaluations. Bill Keane presented the Fall evaluations of the novices. Discussion followed on the organization of the "S" programs.

3. Planning for future events

Tom Mass informed the Council of two coming events: (a) Regional meeting of Provincials in the Los Angeles area, Oct. 21-28, 2012. (b) The Pilgrimage Committee for 2015 is forming.

4. Tri-Delegation: Social Communication, Mission Animation, Youth Ministry

Judy Alvarez, in Social Communication, treated of recent activities and steps towards the relaunching of one province website.

Juan Carlos Montenegro reported on Volunteers, on Salesian Mission Day, Nov. 11-12, 2011, on unity of purpose for the SDB-FMA volunteer program.

Al Vu dealt with the YM Delegates meeting in El Salvador; the responsibilities of the CYMs in the province; and the introduction of the document: Rethinking Salesian Youth Ministry to the province.

DBTI Campaign to End Hunger

Wrapping up a successful monthlong Campaign to End Hunger, Don Bosco Technical Institute students led a 16-mile Walk to End Hunger on Sunday, Dec. 4. Students from Alverno and San Gabriel Mission High Schools also participated. The multi-school walk took a circular path through the San Gabriel Valley, beginning and ending at Bosco Tech.

All proceeds from the walk will be sent to benefit Family Promise and the Catholic Worker, organizations that help lowincome and homeless families in the San Gabriel Valley and the greater Los Angeles community.

The walk followed a month-long, 2,000 pound food drive that benefitted the Shepherd's Pantry and Thanksgiving Goodness, an alumni-run undertaking in which Bosco freshmen, alumni, and volunteers prepared 3,200 sack lunches and distributed them to the homeless in downtown Los Angeles.

motivated, came in third, missing second place by only one point. The three top finishers were JJ Dominguez, his brother, Ruben Dominguez, and Gabriel Castro. The California State Finals is one of the most competitive in the country, and the team finished third out of 24 teams racing.

This followed the intense competition of the CIF Southern Section preliminaries where DBTI team won their heat, beating 15 other schools from throughout the southern half of California. Running for the championship of Southern

California at the finals, they finished second, making them the number two team (of Division 4) in Southern California.

This great finish to the season is the result of the hours of practice the team put in every day (even on Thanksgiving). They ran 30-50 miles a week starting in June (at least

800 miles during the season). They are to be congratulated.




