

Dear Brother and Sister Salesians:

We began yesterday the season of Lent. Is there such a thing as a Salesian Lent? If we are Salesians we are first of all followers of Jesus. Like all our fellow disciples and Christians we Salesians are following Jesus, denying ourselves, taking up our cross, living in hope of the resurrection. And so like all Christians, we Salesians also give alms, pray more and eat less. In that sense there is no such thing as a Salesian Lent.

But in another sense there is. What could be more "Lenten" than work and temperance? Asked to describe the Salesian spirit we tend to think of pastoral love for the young, union with God, sense of church, family spirit, loving kindness, initiative and flexibility, the preventive system as method and spirituality, optimism and joy. But we may tend to forget about work and temperance. It was about work and temperance, not about any other element of our spirit, that Don Bosco said "Work and temperance will make the Congregation flourish, whereas the seeking of an easy and comfortable life will instead bring about its death" (C 18).

The "work" part of work and

temperance is not mindless obsession with doing, doing, doing. The kind of work which becomes penance enough is that tireless energy with which we Salesians are to give ourselves to our mission. Anyone living and working in our presences will find countless opportunities to put his or her own comfort aside and get out there among the kids with an active Salesian presence, as an educator, evangelizer, friend.

And then there's "temperance."
Eating, drinking, resting, and
even working (!) in simplicity and
moderation requires virtue. They
require strength of character
and attention to the moment.
Temperance, our Rule of Life says,
gives us strength to control our
heart, master ourselves and remain
even-tempered.

If we practice work and temperance during this Lent, we will not need to look for unusual or severe penances. The daily demands of our life and ministry, the renunciations of the apostolic life, accepted in true Salesian style, are alms, prayer and fasting enough. Don't get me wrong. I'm not advocating Lent Lite. Give up whatever the Spirit leads you to give up, especially if the Spirit leads you to give up everything else but souls. In Don Bosco's words, Give me souls, take away everything else. Now that's a lifetime's Lent for the Salesian.

Relationships and Bosco Tech Students

novices, and some older students, presented the topic of relationship building. The students were asked to consider and focus on three relationships; relationship with God, relationship with parents, and relationships with possible mates.

The reflection on their relationship with God began with an exercise where they were asked to walk through a mine field while being blindfolded and receiving directions from a classmate. Essentially, the mine field of life can be navigated to our salvation, if we carefully listen to the voice of God and ignore the miss-directions given by the world and bad companions.

The reflection on their relationship with parents also began with an exercise. In this exercise, they were asked to solve











a problem with various limitations that were placed on them that required them to work in unison in order to accomplish the task. Basically, we can do very little in our early years

without the guidance, aid and love of our parents.

The reflection on their relationship with possible mates was centered on the theory and ideas from Sternberg's Triangle Theory for Love and Relationships.

The three parts of the triangle are Intimacy, Passion, and Commitment. The students were asked to reflect on their relationships and how balanced or unbalanced they were and what was needed to either maintain or establish a healthy balanced relationship.

Meanwhile, the older students back at Bosco Tech were also working on their relationships with others. They were generously donating an important aspect of life: their blood, to help others continue living their lives through this wonderful gift.

Diocesan Day of Reflection Connects St. John Bosco to Year for Youth

As the leadership of the Diocese of San Bernardino continues to reflect on youth during the Year for Youth proclaimed last August by Bishop Gerald Barnes, the diocesan Curia and Presbyteral Council gathered together for a day of reflection on the spirituality of St. John Bosco on January 27.

The Curia includes all diocesan department heads, the Chancellor, the Vicar General, two Episcopal Vicars, the Auxiliary Bishop as well as the Ordinary. The Presbyteral Council is made up of 12 priests in the diocese and is the primary priestly advisory body to Bishop Barnes.

The day was lead by Father John Roche, SDB, and Andrew Coffey who shared their considerable experience and insight in youth ministry. The day began with a powerful prayer that called participants to "make the voice of the young heard." It was accompanied by moving photographs of young people and the challenges they face all over the world.

Fr. Roche and Coffey offered an assessment of today's youth, particularly in light of post modernism and other characteristics of the age. Among the observations given were,

- The present generation is largely devoid of leaders, teachers and mentors
- The desire to connect is strong, as evidenced by social networking virtual relationships
- The Church is lacking in moral



- and teaching authority
- Spiritual hunger and the search for meaning is at an all-time high

"He was very insightful in looking at the real needs of youth and the real problems that youth face," said Jeanette Arnquist, Curia member and director of the diocesan Ministry of Life, Dignity and Justice, of Fr. Roche. "And he zeroed in on our primary Christian value – love."

Members of the Curia and Presbyteral Council then engaged in sharing about the observations presented.

Next, Fr. Roche expertly wove a history and description of St. John Bosco together with observations on youth made by Bishop Barnes in his Pastoral Letter on Youth and video message to youth released last Summer.

"St. John Bosco had a great love for youth and his principle of keeping a spiritual focus on youth is important," said Father Leonard De Pasquale, I.M.C., administrator of St. Bernardine parish in San Bernardino and a member of the Presbyteral Council.

A key common thread in St. John Bosco's teaching and Bishop Barnes pastoral letter highlighted by Fr. Roche was the need for the Church to reach out to youth who are disaffected and most at risk of taking a path away from God.

"There are some extreme feelings of isolation and loneliness with our young people," noted Fr. De Pasquale. "We have to work with that."

Father John Vieira, Presbyteral Council member and pastor of St. Elizabeth Ann Seaton parish in Ontario, said there is a need for the Church to accompany youth in their questions and struggles rather than simply prescribe Church teachings.

"It's a call to put ourselves on their level," Fr. Vieira said. "We have to listen to the kids and see where they are coming from first and then we can enlighten them."

At the conclusion of the day Fr. Roche and Coffee presented Bishop Barnes with sculpture of St. John Bosco in honor of the occasion.

The De Sales Hall Project Is On The Move

In the last couple of weeks, Vincor Construction Company had the sub-contractors working on the existing electrical and plumbing to identify what needs to be changed, repaired or added. The communication sub-contractor was on the site to determine how to pull the internet cables, the phone cables and the security lines into particular locations.

The new Los Angeles County Unified Building Code approved windows were ordered and the sub-contractor is scheduled to remove the old windows and install the new ones during the week of March 26, 2012.

Every week during the construction period, the contractor, the architect and the Province's representative meet to review the work that has been done, the construction schedule, any change orders, to answer questions from the participants and hear any suggestions for improvements, e.g. making sure that the wall that separated the community room from the handicap bedroom is sound proofed. The material to be considered is 3/8th inch thick acoustic board panels.

According to the construction schedule, the digging of the elevator pit will commence around the beginning of March, weather permitting.

Southern California Edison is ready to remove the old electrical service and install a new service. SCE will have to wait until the old building is removed before installing the new serve.



The ceiling in the future 3rd floor community room will be removed for insulation and to install new light fixtures and social communication wiring.

Interior walls are opened for new electrical wiring or panel, and to remove old plumbing and conduit pipes.




