

Dear Brother and Sister Salesians:

As we come to the end of 2011, I'd like to give one more thought to vocations. The strenna for 2011 after all was "Come and See," the need for vocation ministry as a priority in our evangelization efforts. And I would like to reflect on this topic once again taking up the Rector Major's orientations to our Region at the conclusion of the InterAmericaTeam Visit in El Salvador last October.

We have already reflected on the first two of his four orientations: returning to Don Bosco the evangelizer, and then perspectives for the Region's future with an emphasis on the quality of our religious life, the reconfiguration of our presences to revitalize the Salesian charism, and the problem of religious discipline. The fourth one concerns immigration, but today let's reflect on the third: Vocational Animation and Formation.

In the area of vocation animation we need two paradigm shifts, the Rector Major suggests. The first is to change from the "fishing" model (just hoping for a bite from somewhere) to one of "sowing, cultivating, and reaping." This touches us, because the few

vocations we have been receiving lately are not the fruit of careful cultivation from within our own presences. Rather we are like the bear who just sits by the river side, passive, mouth open, ready to snag any fish that jumps too high out of the water. And the other paradigm shift is to go from vocation animation primarily on the provincial level to one that involves every local EPC. Let Chinh be the fisherman. But all of us need to be farmers!

The area of formation then is closely connected. It's all about vocation. That we have been called by God to follow Jesus is the reason we embrace a process of life long formation to fidelity to our vocation, both in the initial stages, and perhaps especially in the ongoing ones. From the very beginning of our formation we need to help one another develop an understanding of vocation as God's gift to us and not as our own personal project. Formation is less about following our chosen path, and all about responding to the Lord who calls us to follow his path.

The end of 2011 invites us to give thanks for so many things, chief among them our Salesian vocation. And as 2012 begins on the Feast of Mary Mother of God, the new strenna challenges us to make the young our life's mission, just like Don Bosco did. It's all about vocation.

My dear confreres and friends of Social Communication,

As I write, we have the new provincials here for their introductory course. As part of it the Rector Major and each of the Sector Councillors offers a general overview and presents the priorities for the Congregation, the Mission and each Sector working in harmony with the others. For our part we have offered them the fundamental points of the change of mentality which you already know about and are working for in your own provinces: the Salesian Mission as being at the core of each Sector's concerns



and teamwork amongst the sectors within the framework of the OPP; the importance of a Delegate to animate SC in the province, along with a team and in accordance with the SC Province Plan; formation to SC as a priority for our Sector; information in and beyond the Province, and production and enterprises in function of our mission to the young, always developed in a professional way as indicated in the SSCS.

Amongst the good things we are hoping for in 2012 will be the Synod of Bishops meeting on "New Evangelisation for handing on the Christian Faith". In the working document, six scenarios for evangelisation have been laid out cultural, social, media, economic, scientific and technological research, and political. As well as stating that these six scenarios are profoundly linked, with regard to SC it offers a broad and exciting field for reflection, socialisation and work, and notes particularly the duty to form and be formed, as well as indicating the challenge of solid preparation for sustaining a constructive dialogue between faith and new culture. I invite each Delegate to be ready with his or her team to work with the Church and the Congregation in New Evangelisation; our baptism and our charism call us to this task.

I conclude by wishing you, for my part and on behalf of the members of the Department, that Jesus' coming may find the doors of your being open when he arrives, and that when he enters he may fill you with joy, love, hope and peace. As Communicators may you feel yourselves sent to proclaim the most important news that any human being along with creation itself could hear: God became man, He is Emmanuel, He will be with us and will make of 2012 something new.


The 25th Salesian Mission (SMD) 2012 with the theme "Telling the Story of Jesus" is an opportunity of growing in following in the footsteps of Don Bosco the Saint - educator, pastor, communicator and missionary. Telling the story of Jesus to the young - we all agree on this! There are just some questions: How? When? Where? We know that from a heart full of Jesus there naturally flow words about our Master.

As Sons of Don Bosco, we are called to communicate everywhere: in educational meetings with the young, in small Christian communities, through the radio, the TV, on the Internet, on social networks or through blogs, by means of the theatre or music. The creativity of the great Missionaries shows us all the typical Salesian ways of communicating the faith to non-Christians. The young Churches of Asia, many of them with a life story of scarcely a few decades of first evangelisation inspire us with their dynamic approach in telling the story of Jesus!





What is Salesian Mission Day all about?



bove all it is important to underline that the *Salesian Mission Day* (GMS) is primarily directed to each Salesian and to every local and Provicial Salesian community.

For us Salesians the period of preparation for the bicentenary of the birth of Don Bosco is a call to **rediscover** his great inspirations, his deepest motivations, his courageous choices, and especially his **missionary spirit**. And thus revive and keep alive the missionary flame that is an essential dimension of our Salesian vocation(*Const.* 30).

In a time when there are great needs but a numerical shortage of Salesians there is a real danger that the confreres or a Province would close itself in within its territory because looking beyond, with a sense of mission, would require a new en-

ergy that it does not have. But closing in would, consequently, **extinguish the apostolic zeal and enthusiasm for the Salesians life** which is noticed by young people, especially those who make their vocational discernment with us.

Since 1988 a missionary theme has been offered to the entire Congregation, so that all the salesian communities may get to know about a missionary situation in a particular continent and open its eyes to new missionary situations, overcoming every temptation to shut oneself off in one's own place and to remember the universal outreach of the Salesian charism and live it fully inserted in the heart of the universal Church.

That's why the celebration of the SMD is an important moment in the missionary animation of the Salesians in the Provinces and in the houses; of those who attend our schools, vocational training centres, parishes, oratories, youth groups, and of the Salesian Family, so as to rediscover the missionary zeal of Don Bosco and the dynamic vitality of the Salesian charism!

This is not about an isolated event or an occasional activity but an educative pastoral journey lasting some weeks, or a number of initiatives throughout the year, of which the SMD is its culmination.

Mission Animation

Prayer is my strength to face many missionary challenges



wanted to be a missionary but I had struggled to make the decision because if I were to become a missionary I would live far from my family and my friends. However, towards the end of the postnoviciate, I finally decided to write my application. My greatest desire was to spend my life for others in the mission land in gratitude to God and to Don Bosco for the many blessings I have received as a Salesian.

I was sent to Zambia where I arrived on April 1, 2010. After some weeks of introduction in the capital, Lusaka I went for English language course. Here everything was new and strange to me. Here I attended the longest Mass during the ordination of a priest - 5 hours! I was so surprised when I saw the people singing and dancing during the Eucharist. I was equally surprised when I saw

many poor village youth playing football without shoes and with the ball made of plastic bags.

I still consider myself a greenhorn missionary and I look forward to learning many more new things. So far my main challenge was language. In Zambia there are many languages. I felt really bad when people didn't understand what I was saying as well as when I could not understand what they were trying to tell me. The youth know English and their local language. I often felt alone in their midst because they prefer to speak their local language which I didn't understand at all.

This difficulty sometimes made me to get bored and even made me ask if I did the right thing being a missionary. But I overcame these doubts by sharing my difficulties with a fellow missionary, and some

friends. Through our sharing I realised that I was not alone. So we encouraged each other and continue to pray for one another.

But my greatest strength was in talking to Jesus or just seating in front of the Blessed Sacrament. I knew that he perfectly understood what I wanted to tell him, as well as my difficulties and doubts. I continually pray to him to help me each day because I realised that although my problems, difficulties remain, now I have more energy and deeper motivation to continue my missionary vocation. I also believe that the prayer of so many people like my parents, classmates, and friends sustain me in my missionary vocation. And I am sure that God, our Lady and Don Bosco are always with me!



I am ever grateful to God for the gift of my life and missionary vocation. I am beholden to my parents for continually supporting me in my vocation as a Salesian lay brother. I am thankful to our Congregation for giving me the possibility to follow my missionary vocation!

That Project Europe may open new horizons and stir up new hopes to foster the endogenous revitalisation of the Salesian charism in the continent.


DECEMBER: Mission for Hispanic Migrants in the United States


